

Walking around Marston you discover big conker trees. My favourite ones are along the lane from the Vicky Arms and just outside the Red Lion. Every time I go past one of these trees I pick up a conker and place it in my pocket. It's a force of habit. As a child my favourite conkers were the ones we called cheese graters - the ones with a flat side. These are still my favourite.



When I was younger it was a fight to get the conkers: everyone wanted them. We would go out before breakfast and raid the trees, bringing back

handfuls of our precious treasure. We carefully washed them and divided them into piles. After school we got dad to drill holes. Nowadays, with children more interested in screens and schools banning conker games (because of health and safety) there are no queues or conker fights anymore. Instead, conkers are left to be picked up by nostalgic adults or squashed by cars. In our house we have little piles of them everywhere; my pile is here in my office on my desk. We know that Autumn has really arrived when the conkers are out of their shells. The artist in me is amazed by the variety of their colours - the browns, the creams and black swirls. No one of them is the same. I also love the texture of them in my hand - cold and smooth to the touch.

As I was out walking the other day I noticed a conker falling to the ground. The force of the fall and the impact of hitting the ground caused it to pop open and out rolled a shiny new conker - completely undamaged.

What made it fall I wonder?

Was the conker now too heavy for the branch to hold?

There was certainly no wind, no rain to force it from its captivity.

Had the tree done all that it could? Had the time come for it to let go - to release it?

On the tree the conker had been kept safe, within a prickly, protective shell. Now it was vulnerable. But in this vulnerable state it was free to find soil, to fulfil its potential and grow into a fine horse chestnut tree.

It's interesting how the simple and ordinary things in life cause you to reflect on something much bigger. As I walked across the park, I wondered what prevents me from leaving the tree, as it were. I wondered what scares me about falling. I feel apprehensive about a fall, about being bruised by its impact, but through prayer I may be able to recognise the possibilities and new beginnings that follow it.

It can be hard, even painful when things or people or situations or jobs, which we think are keeping us together, let us down suddenly or cause us to feel like we are falling. Maybe we could be inspired by nature and look harder at what is being released by the impact. What potential is now freed, to flourish and grow?

As we journey through October, as the days get darker and the nights start earlier, remember to allow life and nature to surprise you. God sees the bigger picture and sees our potential - sometimes that can only begin when we are released from the tree we were clinging to.

What to quote in October?

Unharvested by Robert Frost
A scent of ripeness from over a wall.
And come to leave the routine road
And look for what had made me stall,
There sure enough was an apple tree
That had eased itself of its summer load,

May something go always unharvested! May much stay out of our stated plan, Apples or something forgotten and left, So smelling their sweetness would be no theft.

Nature notes: What to see in October?

Wild berries adorn the October hedgerows providing essential food for insects, birds and mammals. Look out for hips and haws (the berries of dog rose and hawthorn) and purple sloes (the fruit of blackthorn).



Tawny owls are vocal in the autumn months establishing their territories particularly on clear nights. Our most abundant owl, they can be found in parks and suburbs. October sees the return of redwings and fieldfares, attractive winter thrushes from northern Europe. They come here to escape harsher winters and enjoy plentiful food including berries. You may hear the "seep seep" call of redwings overhead as they migrate at night.

What to cook? Apple and Almond Pudding Ingredients

1 kilo of peeled and sliced cooking apples
60 gm muscavado/ brown sugar
1 tbsp raisins/cranberries (optional)
110 gm butter at room temperature
110 gm castor sugar
2 large beaten eggs at room temperature
110 gm ground almonds
50 gm flaked almonds

Method

Place the apples and brown sugar into a lidded pan with about 1 tbsp of water and heat gently until softened. Stir to prevent burning from time to time. Butter a large pie dish and put the apples in when soft. In a mixing bowl, cream the butter and castor sugar until pale and fluffy. Beat in the eggs a little at a time. Fold in the ground almonds. Spread the mixture evenly over the apples using the back of a damp tablespoon.



Spread the flaked almonds over the top. Bake for 1 hour at 180 Fan / Gas 5 / 3375F . Cover lightly with foil and/or turn down oven if the flaked almonds are getting too brown.

At the September meeting, the PC had no objections to planning applications submitted by 20 Nicholas Avenue and the Red Lion Pub. Applications from 21 Haynes Road and 19 Arlington Drive were called in. Oxford City Council informed the PC that planning applications at St Nicholas Mobile Home Park and 36 Cavendish Drive had been approved while that of 76 Cherwell Drive had been withdrawn.

Celebrations to mark 60 years of Mortimer Hall and Old Marston Library were well attended by users past and present, with displays of pictures from the time of construction. The PC would like to thank all who helped with organising and setting up exhibits.

The PC has also adopted a logo for its website, social



media and stationery. Thank you and congratulations to Matthew Turner who designed the logo, and won a £50 voucher for a venue of his choice.

Walls of the underpass under Marston Ferry Road have been

cleaned and prepared by OCC, which will also fund a subsequent protective coating. The painting is being done by students from Meadowbrook College in years 1 to 11, funded by OMPC. A big thank you to all those involved in creating this wonderful artwork.

The PC is introducing a 'Thank You' award. This is to acknowledge the important role of local parishioners who, over time, have acted in the best interest of the parish by their good deeds, energy and enthusiasm.

There have been several incidences of antisocial and criminal behaviour within the parish. A flier will be delivered to every household in the parish making people aware of what to do if they witness or are subject to antisocial behaviour. The chairman and clerk met a member of the Oxfordshire Youth Service to consider different solutions.

The marvellous Meadowbank Mural

September 2022: The weather cooled down, school re-started — and those who travel through the underpass next to St Nicholas School were thrilled to see the murky half of the underpass be whitewashed and then burst into an energetic, fizzing, fast and furious, bright and cheerful pzazz of flowery, zappy colour.

The pupils of Meadowbrook College were asked by Old Marston Parish Council to design and paint a mural. Started by last year's post-GCSE art & photography students, the design uses the seven colours of the rainbow, plus sharp black and white. It combines the rainbow theme with dripping and symbols. The students have looked at the work of Hattie Stewart, a young British doodle artist (take a look at her website and Doodlebomb Sticker Book if you want to know more) and brought their knowledge of tattoo art to bear.

The work has been co-ordinated by the College's Art Teacher Jinny Mills and Creative Art Lead Sam Ridgley. It is being executed by many from the student body, from Y1 and Y2 children up to Year 11; by those taking an Art & Photography GCSE and those not. 'We wanted creating the mural to be accessible to all and for all to feel successful', said Jinny Mills.

The project being properly funded by the council and well received by the public has been a massive boost for the students of Meadowbrook; feeling valued in the community. The process has been a positive experience for work experience, coursework and self-esteem.
