

"No fruits, no flowers, no leaves, no birds! — November!" Thomas Hood

November is seen as the bleakest month of the year. Thomas Hood evokes the cold and discomfort. His fellow poet John Clare thinks of the fog: "*The landscape sleeps in mist from morn till noon.*" November makes Hardy and Housman consider



death and oblivion; it reminds Walter de la Mare of lost loves; and the more prosaic Royal Horticultural Society predicts "frost, gales and freezing rain" for the

gardener.

In November we start to see winter viruses taking hold; we struggle with travelling in ice or fog and this year there is the added worry of the cost of heating and preparing hot food for many people. The solemnity of Remembrance Sunday comes with echoes of suffering and carnage alongside the bravery and self-sacrifice. November is a month of endings, especially in church, where we come to the end of one liturgical year before the anticipation of Advent which begins the next.

To add to all this, as the days get shorter and daylight saving brings darkness at tea-time, around 2 billion of us suffer from Seasonal Affective Disorder: depression and tiredness related to the lack of light. So where are the gleams of brightness breaking through the November fog?

There is still beauty out of doors, though we have to look harder for it, perhaps with a photographer's eye. November in the next Countryfile calendar pictures a runner by a bare, wind-bent tree, its branches etched



against a grey sky. It reminds me that when I look up,

I love the shapes of the bare branches once the leaves have fallen. In gardens, the pink flash of a nerine, or the winter warmth of chrysanthemums seem all the more striking against a backdrop of browns and greys. Robins and goldfinches still brighten our mornings.



Remembrance Day reminds us how much individual lives matter, especially when we read out the names on the war memorial. I recall how my grandmother, many years after World War 1, was moved to see her brother's name in the Book of Remembrance. In spite of all

the general horror of war, we can think of each person as someone who mattered, who was loved by family and friends and by God.

In the cold dark days, warmth (especially an open fire) and social events become more special. On Tuesday, 1 November, we can meet around the firepit outside the vicarage and eco-hub to celebrate the oncoming winter season. If you prefer your warmth indoors, our new Wednesday Welcome begins on 2 November in the Church Hall from 3.30-

5.30: a heated space, tea, cake and activities for those who want them. Everyone is welcome. Later in the month, the 4pm service, with refreshments in the Hall, on 20



November offers a chance to think about renewal. The Psalmists also think about renewal and amongst the beautiful images in Psalm 42 is a refrain that is particularly appropriate if we are sunk in November gloom:

Why, my soul, are you downcast? Why so disturbed within me?

Put your hope in God,

for I will yet praise him, my Saviour and my God.

What to quote in November?


Nature notes: What to see in November?

November is a good month for spotting birds with the trees mostly bare. Robins are particularly easy to see. There will be one establishing his territory through



song close to where you live and keen to defend it when the breeding seasons

starts. Winter thrushes arrive in droves this month, eager to feast on berries or invertebrates on open ground. Hedgehogs will be looking for a place to hibernate so if you have a garden, reserve piles of leaves for them to snuggle into. Birds and mammals still need fresh water (and food) so don't forget to replenish empty bird feeders and water bowls.



Grease and line an 18cm square brownie tin with baking paper. Put the biscuits into a plastic bag and break them into smaller pieces by rolling with a rolling pin. Place the butter, dark chocolate and golden syrup in a bowl over a large saucepan of boiling water and stir until chocolate has melted. Stir and set aside to cool. In a separate bowl mix together the marshmallows, raisins and Rice Krispies. Stir the biscuits, and $\frac{2}{3}$ of the marshmallow mix into the chocolate mixture until everything is combined. Then stir in the chocolate chips. Tip the mixture into the lined baking tin and spread it out to the corners. Sprinkle the remaining marshmallow mix evenly over



the top. Place in the refrigerator and chill for at least 2 hrs. Use a sharp knife run under hot water to cut into 12 portions.

Old Marston Parish Council report

At the October PC meeting the council looked at a planning application from 78 Oxford Road to which it had no objection. There was also an application from land to the rear of 1 Cromwell Close which it asked to be called in. Oxford City Council informed the PC that 21A Oxford Road has been approved. The developments at Hill View Farm and Almonds Farm have gone to judicial review.

Moore, the external auditor for Oxfordshire's parish councils, has signed off the PC's accounts for 2021/22 noting no irregularities and the final document will be posted on the council's website shortly.

There has been a great deal of positive reaction to artwork on the walls leading to the underpass. The PC initiated the project and paid for the paint, whilst county highways funded the repair, preparation and protective coating. Staff and pupils of Meadowbrook College created the designs and painted the walls themselves – a big thank you to them for their hard work and amazing contribution to the community.

The agreement between Old Marston Mill Lane Allotments Association and the PC has been renewed for a further 25 years. This gives the allotments and the association security until 2053. The PC would like to take this opportunity to thank OMMLAA's committee and allotment holders for all the hard work and commitment they put in to run the site. We all appreciate the importance that green spaces and gardening have in helping with people's mental wellbeing and in providing fresh, healthy food.

The PC's firework evening will be on Sat 5 Nov at the Red Lion pub, starting at 8.30pm. This is a free event open to the whole community with fireworks provided by the PC.

The next OXCLEAN litter pick will be on Sat 4 Mar 2023: a reminder will be posted on the noticeboard and website nearer the time. Please do join us as we would love to see you and your hard work will be making a difference to our community.


