

'But Jesus called them to him, saying, "Let the children come to me, and do not hinder them, for to such belongs the kingdom of God"' is a favourite verse of mine; often quoted and meaning that everyone including children -are welcomed into the kingdom of God. It is because of this open invitation and love of Jesus that I find myself writing this article today. I am Helen Norman, the new children and families minister for St Nicholas Marston. I have just completed a busy month in my new role, in which I have tried to get to know as many people as I can: if I have not spoken to you, please forgive me and say hello if you see me around the parish.



I would like to say what a warm and loving welcome I have received; I have enjoyed meeting so many people in different groups and activities. I am looking forward to serving the community and making new connections and initiatives.

Here is a little about me. I was born in a small town in Derbyshire called Belper (famous for the first fireproof cotton mill and

important in the industrial revolution), went to Leicester for my first degree and Nottingham Trent for my PGCE. I taught in Derbyshire until 2014 when I came to Oxford. Husband Luke studied theology here while I have continued to teach in Oxford schools. I have two children aged 11 and 15 and a big black German shepherd dog named Nox. I have worked with children aged 3-11 and have volunteered in toy libraries, baby & toddler groups, youth groups and run parent support and Bible study groups. As well as having a stint on a PTA I have also been a governor.

My church background is varied: granddaughter of a Methodist lay preacher, member of a teenage C of E youth group and then as a young leader member of a URC church whilst at university. My husband is serving his curacy in the Anglo-Catholic church of St. Andrews Headington. As a teacher for almost twenty-five years I was surprised and excited to find myself resigning

from full time teaching and subsequently applying and being appointed in this Parish. 'For I know the plans I have for you...plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you a hope and future' says Jeremiah. This verse could equally be written for all the young



people who, for one reason or another are connected to Marston, whether this is in the Toddler Group, Youth choir, Messy and Junior Church, Pulse (the Youth group he schools or in one of the many and varied church services. In a world of worry and anxiety, whether about financial hardship, social media, exams, parenting and climate change there are plans of a hope and a future. We are living in a country where a quarter of young people have mental health



difficulties, over four million children are living in poverty and where a sandwich generation is looking after grandchildren and

elderly parents. A paper from the General Synod stated a few years ago 'our engagement with young people is limited. Most churches have no or very few young people under 16'.

As a community we need to be looking at ways that we can give our young people hope that things can change and support all those involved in the care and upbringing of our young people here in Marston. I cannot do this alone: it requires the community to look at what we can do. We must continue to work together, engaging with the future of faith and the church today. What to quote in June?

Nature notes: What to see and hear in June?



June belongs to the swifts, which can often be seen overhead in fast-moving screaming parties, particularly at dusk. These iconic crescent-shaped migrants usher in summer with their unique soundtrack. They spend most of their lives on the wing, even sleeping in flight. Incredibly, in its lifetime a swift may fly a distance of some 4 million miles. Look out for the pale pink flowers of dog rose in the hedgerows and closer to the ground the purple sweet pea-like flowers of common vetch. June can be a hot month so do keep a shallow bowl of water in your garden for visiting wildlife.

What to make in June Best ever chocolate sauce



Ingredients

180g light brown muscavado sugar
(or any sugar you have in the cupboard)
100g cocoa powder
300ml milk or non-dairy substitute
15g butter or non-dairy substitute
1tsp vanilla essence (optional)

Method

Place all the ingredients in a pan and mix well.

Simmer slowly and stir all the time until the mixture bubbles round the edges and becomes thick. It will thicken more when cool. Great with ice cream or waffles.



Bellringers' report

Our merry band of bellringers has finally been able to return to outings after the disruption caused by pandemic lockdowns. The first outing, in April, saw 22 ringers of all ages and abilities venture to the towers of Chearsley (6), Thame (8), and Great Haseley (6). These numbers represent how many bells are in each tower. As you might guess, this provides an opportunity for the St Nicholas church (6 bells) ringers to try their hand in other towers, where each set of bells behaves differently. To ring eight bells is another challenge too. Some of our outings take us further afield, such as recent ones to Hertfordshire and Bedfordshire.

The Marston ringers often travel across the county to support other bands, creating a full complement of ringers for services and special events, where there would otherwise not be enough. Important occasions that we have rung for recently include a quarter-peal (45 minutes of non-stop ringing) for St George's Day, the King's Coronation, and May Day: the first time a quarter-peal has been rung at St Nicholas' on May morning for 12 years.

Our handbell ringers worked hard at expanding their repertoire to provide entertainment at the Earth Day event. Having played a selection of tunes, we spoke to many interested people and invited them to venture up the tower for a chance to ring a bell. There was much interest and we've been asked by two local youth organisations if we could take the handbells along for the children to play.

Old Marston Parish Council report

At the May annual Parish Council meeting the council re-elected Duncan Hatfield as chairman and Pat Hall as vice-chair. It also reviewed the councillors serving on our various committees and external organisations, as well as its policies and delegated arrangements.

The Parish Council looked at planning applications from 6 Harlow Way, 31 Beechey Avenue, amended plans for Court Place Farm Pavilion in Marsh Lane and a retrospective application for 45 Arlington Drive. The PC had no concerns with any of the applications.

The PC will have a stall at the Love Marston, Love Life event on Sun 21 May in the Mortimer Hall Recreation Ground.

Old Marston Parish Council meets the criteria of having two thirds elected councillors and a qualified clerk, so at the annual meeting adopted the General Powers of Competence. This essentially means it can do anything an individual can do if it is legal. In the past the PC has been restricted by certain laws and regulations.

The PC is sending out a 'Community Needs' Survey to find out residents' feelings, thoughts and views on various local issues and facilities. Please do complete and return the survey. The more responses received the better, as this will give a true local picture and the PC will be more informed in its service to the local community. It will be delivered to homes and is available from the website to download. Full PC meetings are scheduled for 5 June, 3 July, 4 Sep, 2 Oct, 6 Nov & 4 Dec at 7pm at Mortimer Hall. Other committees meet there on the last Monday of each month at 6pm.
