

Feasting and fasting

For most of the 900 years that St Nicholas has been the parish church of Old Marston, feasts and fasts would have shaped the lives of the local people. Holidays came at the times of religious festivals and celebrations such as Christmas and Easter followed the penitence and fasting of Advent and Lent. Feasts would often have been community events, like the harvest suppers that followed the hard work of bringing in the crops.

Harvest suppers were major feasts. Flora Thompson's book *Lark Rise* recalls her Oxfordshire childhood at the beginning of the 20th century. She describes how the farm workers would be invited to



a huge harvest home dinner at the farmer's house after the last sheaf of corn was collected. Hams were boiled, sirloins roasted, plum puddings stacked

and eighteen-gallon casks of ale were tapped. Farm workers suffered from poor wages and harsh working conditions, but they knew how to feast when they had the opportunity.

We are all familiar with the idea of some sort of fasting or abstinence in Lent, but if you had lived in



Marston some five hundred years ago, fasting would have made up as much as a third of your year: this might have been in small ways, such as avoiding meat on

Fridays or for longer periods of abstaining from all meat and dairy products. However your feasts would have been much longer celebrations – though peacock and boar's head might not have been as appealing as roast turkey!

The survival of the church building for 900 years also owes a debt to one of the customs at feast times. Church or Parish ale was traditionally brewed by the



churchwardens at feast times, especially at Whitsun, as a fund raiser for the local poor and the maintenance of the church. A humorous verse from the time of George III reads:

The Churches much owe, as well we do knowe For when they be drooping and ready to fall, By a Whitsun or Church Ale up again they shall go. And owe their repairing to a pot of good ale.

There are serious, spiritual reasons for this pattern of fasting and feasting. Although they seem very different, they are really two sides of the same coin, because they are both about our relationship with God. Times of fasting and prayer have always had the purpose of helping us to focus on our spiritual lives and on drawing closer to God. Times of feasting are not about over-indulgence but to celebrate God's goodness and provision for us and the community we live in.

Here at St Nicholas we have missed Skye over the months of her sabbatical, but we know that she has been using her time in pilgrimage and prayer and deepening her faith. Now she is returning, it is a great time for a feast! At our all-age, 10am service on Sunday 3 Sept, which Skye will be leading, we shall also be welcoming back some of the children she has baptised since she came to St Nicholas. Afterwards there will be a barbecue in the vicarage garden (though without the eighteen-gallon casks of ale!) Do come to the service and the barbecue and welcome Skye back.

What to quote in September?

My Dragonflies by Ruary Mackenzie Dodds Of all the insects in the skies The brightest are my dragonflies. My dragonflies are stained-glass men Who loop and turn and loop again. On crystal wings they catch the light, Like neon shards in jump-jet flight.

Nature notes: What to see and hear in September?

September is a month of change. Swallows prepare to migrate and often gather on telegraph wires before their long journey to the southern hemisphere. Hedgerows are awash with crab apples and berries, great for jam or jelly-making, with blackberries at their best this month. Folklore dictates that they should never be picked after Michaelmas Day, 29 September. Look out for inquisitive dragonflies and in particular the migrant hawker (pictured). You might see one "hawking" for insect prey, well away from water. Hedgehogs need to fatten up ready for hibernation. If you have a garden, you could put out meaty cat or dog food and fresh water for them.



What to cook in September? Raspberry almond streusel cake Ingredients 100g softened unsalted butter 100g caster sugar 2 large eggs 100g self-raising flour 300g raspberries icing sugar to serve For the streusel topping 50g plain flour pinch of salt 25g caster sugar 50g flaked almonds **Method**

Heat the oven to 180C/350F/gas mark 4 Line a 20cm cake tin with baking parchment For the streusel topping, melt the butter in a small saucepan, stir in the flour, salt and sugar to make a crumbly mixture, then stir in the almonds and set aside.



For the cake, cream together butter and sugar. Beat in the eggs, one at a time, adding a spoonful of flour with each egg. Fold in the remaining flour. Put the batter in the tin and spread evenly. Scatter the raspberries on the top and cover with the streusel mix. Bake for about 45 minutes (until a

skewer comes out clean). Leave to cool in the tin. Dust with icing sugar.

What is Divya Shanthi?

If you read the Marston Times or attend St Nicholas Church, you may have seen news and updates from Divya Shanthi in Bangalore, India, but perhaps you've wondered what this charity is and how it's connected to St Nicholas.

Divya Shanthi was founded over 50 years ago by Colleen and Vinay Samuel, who are regulars at St Nicholas when they're at their home in Marston. For much of the year they are in Bangalore, working with the team at Divya Shanthi running a school for 500 children ages 5-16, along with boarding homes for children from birth to 18+ who are orphaned or unable to be cared for by their families. They also run health clinics, churches, youth groups, and homework clubs, seeking to serve 'the poorest of the poor' - families and individuals in very difficult circumstances.

Divya Shanthi Mission Support (DSMS) is a small Marston-based charity founded over 20 years ago by members of St Nicholas Church. We raise money in the UK to send to Divya Shanthi, through regular donations, fundraising events, and child sponsorship. Our next event is our Christmas Market on Sat 2 Dec from 2.30pm-4.30pm.

As a church, St Nicholas sponsors a child at Divya Shanthi: Muthyalamma, who has just turned 10 years old. She and her younger sister are orphans and both live at Divya Shanthi. Muthyalamma had some health difficulties a few years ago but is much better now. Divya Shanthi staff describe her as a very bright student who is helpful to her classmates and has a talent for singing, dancing, and drama. There's a photo of her and a Christmas card from her on the notice board in the church hall.

Old Marston Parish Council report

There was no council meeting in August. However, the planning committee met to view applications from 60 Cherwell Drive, 2 Broughton Close, 33 Ashlong Road and 14 Salford Road, to which the committee had no objections.

The planning committee had concerns with the application from 32B Oxford Road regarding height of the proposed new dwelling and not within keeping of surrounding existing dwellings.

Concerning the application from Marston Paddock in Butts Lane: the committee asked for clarification on the planned cycle route from the ring road through the Paddock and beyond and why the footpath at the rear of the Paddock needs to be removed. Although permission has been granted, pedestrian and cycle routes need further examination, particularly as access to the site is limited, presenting a danger to both pedestrians and cyclists. Further concerns were voiced about access for emergency services, refuse lorries and construction vehicles, which all must negotiate via a very small entrance. There is also no mention about where such vehicles turn round: not only is there danger to existing walls and buildings but to pedestrians and cyclists. The PC, reflecting the concerns of those that live locally, would like an urgent review of the plans before an accident occurs, during or after construction.

Oxford CC has informed the PC that planning applications from 21 Haynes Road, 60 Cherwell Drive and 9 Gordon Close have been refused while those from 10 Nicholas Avenue, Court Place Farm Pavilion, Marsh Lane, 31 Beechey Avenue and 45 Arlington Drive have been approved.

At the time of writing this there is still no decision from the judicial review on the proposed developments at Almond's Farm and Hill View Farm.

There have been further instances of vandalism at the recreation ground. Last month the 'NO DOGS' notices on the play area gate of Boults Lane Recreation Ground had been ripped down. Now the 'NO DOG' notices at the Mortimer Hall Recreation Ground have been removed too! Replacements have been ordered. The PC next meets on 4 September and then on 2 Oct, 6 Nov & 4 Dec at 7pm at Mortimer Hall. Other committees meet there on the last Monday of each month at 6pm.
