In October we admired the autumnal leaves with their various hues. The bright yellows, green tints, golds, multifarious reds and shades of brown, created images that linger in the mind. But now the particoloured decorations in the trees are quickly disappearing and the crisp, withered leaves rustle on the branches or drift about the ground. The poet William C. Bryant captured these November days well when he wrote:

The melancholy days are come, the saddest of the year,

Of wailing winds, and naked woods, and meadows brown and sere.

Heaped in the hollows of the grove the autumn leaves lie dead;

They rustle to the eddying gust, and to the rabbit's tread.

Out of my window I stare at the bare limbs of the trees and see a few leaves clinging, as it were, to life, and the thought comes: Why do they wish to stay when all their comrades are gone? Are they *that* determined to hang onto life - even if it's their destiny to fall?



November can elicit thoughts of endings and death, not only of leaves and flowers, but also of our own dear departed. It is fitting that the

Anglican Church has dedicated this month to the Holy Souls. On the first of November we celebrate the Feast of the Triumphant Saints; and the following day is the commemoration of All Souls. Our All Souls service was earlier this year, falling on the last Sunday of October with a Celtic gathering on the 31st. Another service for remembering is on 12 November, when we remember those combatants who died in battle, regardless of which side they fought for, in our Remembrance service.

It has been said to me that autumn can be depressing. However, our thoughts can move from sad and sombre musings to things more hopeful

when we recall, "Nature does no idle thing."

Nothing in nature is totally destroyed; something new always develops. "Unless, the grain of wheat die, itself remaineth alone." (John 12:24) We see the need for this rest - not death - in nature. If all flowers and grasses and foliage are to awaken to new life in the spring, this death is necessary. I believe this applies to ourselves as well. It is only by our earthly death that we can be born to our new lives in God's eternal heavenly Kingdom.

It is no coincidence that the month of November also marks the end of the Church's year. At the beginning of the new Church year, the first Sunday of Advent, the liturgy's theme is the second coming of Christ. But it's



important to know where we have been and where we are going before we begin a new chapter in our life of faith. The end of the Church's year calls us to renewed awareness of our goal with the solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, the King. We are encouraged to look at our faith over that year from beginning to end, and from end to new beginning as we step into Advent.

I pray that this month will be a blessing to you, that you will see the beauty in the change of season and see the hope of new life; as we die to the old and are born to the new knowing through all that we are held in love in the hands of God.

For those of us that may need an extra reminder of God's love during this season, there is a little gift made especially for you in church.

## What to quote in November?

**November Skies** by John Freeman

Than these November skies

## Nature notes: What to see and hear in November?

November sees an influx of winter thrushes including redwings, our smallest thrush, an attractive bird (pictured) with a distinctive cream stripe over the eye and red patch under the wing. They arrive from Scandinavia and Iceland to enjoy our warmer winters and feast on autumn berries, worms and even windfall apples in parks and gardens. You may hear their soft "seep" call as they migrate overhead at night. The end of the month (27 Nov) sees the Beaver Moon. There were once beavers living in the Thames valley. Perhaps they will be re-introduced one day, as has happened in some parts of the UK.



## What to cook in November - Lancashire Parkin Ingredients.

150g golden syrup  
150g black treacle (or another 150g golden syrup)  
125g granulated sugar  
125g butter  
225g plain wholemeal flour  
225g porridge oats  
2 tsp ground ginger  
½ tsp bicarbonate of soda  
150ml milk

## Method

Grease and line a tin of approx. 23cms x 20cms and heat oven to 180C/gas mark 4. Place syrup and treacle in small saucepan and heat on a low temperature until the butter is melted, stirring all the time. Mix the flour, porridge oats and ginger together in a separate bowl. Pour in the butter mixture and stir well. Add the



bicarbonate of soda and stir quickly and thoroughly. Pour into prepared tin and bake for about 50 minutes until golden brown and springy to touch. Remove from tin and cool

thoroughly on a rack before cutting into squares.

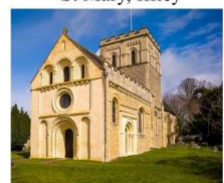

### **Bellringers' report**

At the end of September we took the handbells on tour to two local Beaver Scout groups to teach them the art of making music. They did really well, with a total of 33 children learning how to play a merry tune whilst handling the instruments safely. At the Community Market we spent our time introducing our neighbours to the intricacies of handbells and the tower bells – some said they hadn't even realised it's the same ringers for both. We in turn were taught a little more about the physics of sound waves by an interested party.

St Nicholas has a venerable history of ringing (as can be seen on our website). The tower bells have been in position since the reign of Edward VI. Ringers used to ring on the ground floor, but when the balcony was installed in the 1970s, together with a sixth bell (and no, we didn't stretch the tower to fit it in), ringing moved upstairs to its current position. For many years the tower in our village was actually the leading five-bell tower in the world. We're one of the best to learn on locally and always kept busy.

There has been a plethora of quarter peals recently, with the ringing of Plain Bob Doubles and Plain Bob Minor methods sitting alongside Stedman, Reverse Canterbury, Grandsire, Cambridge Surprise Major and St Anne. Further quarter peals we have supported include St Giles (8), Bletchington (6), and Enstone (6). On 14 Oct we travelled north for our autumn ringing outing, visiting the towers of Tysoe (6), Wroxton (5), and Swalcliffe (6) and as we head towards Christmas we're gearing up for our evening visit by the Pulse youth club and a few more handbell engagements. Where will you see us next? Perhaps up the tower? You're always more than welcome, whatever your age.

### **Old Marston Parish Council report**

At the October PC meeting there were planning applications from 82 Arlington Drive and 2 Mortimer Drive to which the PC had no objections. An application from 21 Haynes Road raised concerns over upper floor emergency exits and insufficient parking for the number of rooms. Oxford City Council has informed the PC that planning applications for 4 Haynes Road, 71 Cherwell Drive, 1 Harlow Way, 3 Rimmer Close and 33 Ashlong Road have all been approved. 60 Cherwell Drive was refused and 32B Oxford Road was withdrawn.

There was also an amended application from Land North of Bayswater Brook which still gives the PC concerns as Old Marston is not mentioned in any traffic management plans. At the time of writing there is still no decision from the judicial review on the proposed developments at Almond's Farm and Hill View Farm. Apparently, this could take up to six months.

Parish Councillor Louise Milford is unwell and the PC has given her six months leave of absence from council meetings. The council and clerk wished her well in her recovery and looked forward to welcoming her back.

Parish Councillor Peter Cox has resigned from the PC. The council and clerk thanked Peter for his long and active service and wished him well for the future.

The vacancy for a new parish councillor has been advertised on the council noticeboard and social media for interested individuals.

There have been further instances of vandalism within the parish. In Mortimer Hall Recreation Ground the handlebar on the small seesaw have been removed. It has been cordoned off to discourage its use and a new seesaw has been ordered.

The PC has ordered a wreath for another war grave situated at the rear of the church. The council agreed to purchase a natural wreath to reduce the amount of plastic used. This will go on the memorial and five will go on war graves. A donation will be made to the RBL to support the living while remembering the dead.

The PC has decided to give financial support to St Nicholas church for community events throughout the year and to Old Marston Charities Trust to assist in the running of the community larder.

Several bicycles have been left on the cycle racks outside Mortimer Hall. This is causing issues for cyclists who use the hall and library. The PC is looking at adopting a system used by OCC which tags abandoned bikes and removes them later.

The Community Market at Mortimer Hall on 7 Oct was a great success and the organisers are looking at possible future events. A big thank you to the organisers.

The council instructed the clerk to write to the county and city councils to express concerns at the unsatisfactory way in which the grass verges are being managed. The cuttings have been left on the surface, creating a thatch which hinders the growth of any wildflowers.
