

Dear Friends,

'Christmas is really for the children' you will have

heard it said. In fact, someone said it to me just last week. I sympathise with the sentiment: once the excited



anticipation of childhood and the squeals of glee on opening presents have passed, Christmas can feel like a whole lot of noise and mess. It can involve a whole lot of work and spending on presents which seem to get smaller and more 'useful' every year. Of course Christians believe that it's a whole lot more than that and the story of a baby born in a stable is only one part of a very grown-up narrative about why we are here, about being loved beyond measure, about ultimately the whole of creation being redeemed from the darkness and the pain that so often afflicts it. It's a grown-up story about holy insurrection against a cruel Roman regime and the powers throughout history that have wanted to own and control; about a child who grew to be a man who told people to live and love and accept something different to what was deemed acceptable at the time - and who died for that (you always did if you were anti-Roman establishment). It's a story about resurrection and wonder and abundant life and unearned, unending love and grace for all.

But – it's Christmas! It's the baby in the manger bit of the story. It's time to celebrate! It's time to chase



away the darkness with feasting and lights and sparkle and gifts. It's to remind ourselves, as humankind has been doing since the dawn of – well, humanity - that the Light shines in the darkness and the darkness has never overcome it – that the cold and fear of winter will not last forever and that the light will return once more. And for Christians, and all who want to believe it, that the darkness, cold and fear of the world will not last forever either. We should make merry, because we have something to celebrate: let's try and remember that, through all the preparations and chaos.

So perhaps people are right when they say Christmas is for the children really. Christmas is for us all, small or grown-up children as we may be. We can be reminded that Jesus said we



should all become like children (Matthew 18:1-4). In other words, try to stop worrying and making things so hard for ourselves and for other people. Be like children this Christmas, however old you are, whenever you can find a moment. Smile at the colour and the glitter and the music; make time for family, or friends, or community in some way; feast for a day or two and give gifts that bring smiles but don't break the bank.

What to quote in December?

Nature notes: What to see and hear in December?

At first glance it might seem that the natural world has gone to sleep but there is plenty to spot in early winter: squirrels remain active, collecting and caching nuts, then trying to find them again; and birds are active feeding in the daylight hours to ensure they survive the long winter nights. Look out for muntjac deer, which are most active at dawn and dusk. If you can, go and see a starling murmuration (Otmoor is a good place) and witness one of nature's wonders. Arrive well before dusk to watch thousands of starlings gather in huge numbers to form swirling flocks which merge and form incredible patterns.



What to cook in December - Chocolate Brownies Ingredients

300g 70% dark chocolate

250g unsalted butter

450g dark muscovado sugar

6 eggs

180g plain flour

2 tsp vanilla essence

1 tsp baking powder

Method

Preheat oven to 190C

Melt chocolate and butter in a bowl over simmering water. Pour into a food processor, add the sugar and mix thoroughly.

Break all six eggs into a jug and add, one by one, alternately with spoonfuls of the flour, blending thoroughly as you go. Add the essence and baking powder, scrape down the sides of the mixer and give one last, thorough whizz. Pour into a baking tin measuring 24cm x 16.5cm x 2.5cm high and lined with baking parchment. Bake for 19 mins. Remove and allow to cool thoroughly in tin, then chill in fridge. Do NOT be tempted to bake for any longer: you will simply



get very boring, dry sponge. Alternatively, come and buy brownies at Jen and Jan's stall at the Divya Shanthi sale on 2 December and save yourself the bother of all that washing up...






















The Swan Community Choir

Bellringers' report for December

The festive period sees us ringing for Christmas and New Year services on top of our usual exploits, plus requests for handbells – this year, three performances on the same day. We have such a small band, it is difficult to be everywhere, but we are doing our best.

Sun 15 Oct's quarter peal was dedicated to Sir Brian Smith whose family were present to hear us ring. He was a long-time resident in Old Marston, having moved to Apple Tree House on Boults Lane in 1966 with his then wife Peggy and their children - Caroline, Mark and Nick. He became active in village life and was Master of St Catherine's College, later moving to Wales where he became Vice-Chancellor of Cardiff University. Knighted in 1999, he returned to Apple Tree House on his retirement in 2001. Throughout his years in Old Marston the sound of St Nicholas' bells held a special place in his heart.

Another commemoration was made on Sun 22 Oct, this time for the life of Sir Bobby Charlton, most widely regarded as England's finest ever footballer.

Alison Merryweather-Clarke is aiming to ring a quarter peal every day of 2023 in different towers. St Nicholas' has been pleased to support her on several occasions throughout the year.

At the time of writing, we are about to welcome the youth group to the church to learn to ring and we will be attending Wolvercote church to see its new video cameras in the bell tower.

Merry Christmas to everyone who supports the ringers, be that in kind words or donations. Over the past year, we have really felt you get behind us as we have been able to be more visible. Great news from Court Farm Allotments

Old Marston Parish Council report for November

There was no objection to the planning application from 32B Oxford Road. An application from 46 Oxford Road gave rise to concerns about unsuitable vehicle access and the size of the site for a residential property. Oxford City Council has approved applications from 2 Broughton Close and 82 Arlington Drive.

The proposed development at Almond Farm has been approved. With this approval and the potential developments at Hill View Farm and land north of Bayswater Brook, the PC is planning a meeting between the parish, city and county councils to discuss the traffic implications for the whole parish.

There were three candidates for the vacancy created by Peter Cox's resignation. The PC elected Mr Martin Smith as parish councillor until the next election in 2026. The PC would like to thank all three candidates and hopes the two unsuccessful candidates will be interested in any future vacancy.

The PC has agreed to buy three new picnic benches for the Mortimer Hall Recreation ground, making a total of five. Additional seats in the play area are also being considered.

The next meeting will be on Monday 4th December at 7pm in Mortimer Hall
