What do you associate March with? The season of Spring perhaps? Certainly the view from my window is very spring-like with daffodils, crocuses and tulips waving at me. The sun was out and doing her thing this morning, but then the wind came and brought



more rain. Will March be full of rain or perhaps a little sun? One thing is for certain, the days are getting longer and brighter!

I feel we are in a time of transitions; liturgically, at St Nicholas we are in Lent, a somber time of repentance, but around us nature is giving us some small but certain signals that new life is coming. This time of transition offers a myriad of wonderful contradictions: birdsong and storms, daffodils and mud, a new dress under a winter coat. As we witness this rebirth and awakening after winter we may find ourselves with more energy, a desire to be outside, or the need to start spring cleaning!

I realise it can seem strange that the church is in a period of penitence and abstinence when around us

we have colour and new life emerging. Is this to make Lent even harder for those observing it? For me, the time of



Lent helps me to appreciate the colours, life and rebirth even more and on a spiritual level - the time between now and Easter, or Ostara - is like an inner spring clean. All the things that weigh us down, distract us or stop us from living brightly-coloured lives are sought out, organised, ditched or forgiven.

I feel I can enter Holy Week and Easter day - on the 31st this year - with a different mindset, because I realise how much I need God, and how much I still need to learn in letting go and trusting in God for growth and balance.

On Easter day we will celebrate the rising of Christ from the dead and the new colours and vibrancies of Spring will seem like precursors to this great celebration. They are the hints of the resurrection in the period of penitence, the little pinpricks of light and joy that can keep us going through the times of hardship.



My prayer for you, regardless of your faith or where you are right now, is that March will be a time of new discoveries and new beginnings. ı am especially excited that we have our Spring Fun Morning on 23 March just two days after the Spring Equinox: this fun day was delayed from

March 2020 and it will be a wonderful community event.

Do know you are all very welcome to any of our services here in Marston or Elsfield: check out our website (stnicholasmarston.org.uk) and join us for

Easter Day. I particularly love the Sunrise service at 6am on Easter Day, although I am aware it will feel



even earlier this year with the clocks going forward. Though as I think about the sacrifice of Christ at Easter time, I realise that getting out of bed earlier than I would like is worth it.

What to quote in March?

The Door of Spring by Ethelwyn Wetherald How shall we open the door of Spring That Winter is holding wearily shut? Though winds are calling and waters brawling, And snow decaying and light delaying, Yet it will not move in its yielding rut And back on its flowery hinges swing, Till wings are flapping And woodpeckers tapping With sharp, clear rapping At the door of Spring.

How shall we fasten the door of Spring Wide, so wide that it cannot close? Though buds are filling and frogs are trilling, And violets breaking and grass awaking, Yet doubtfully back and forth it blows Till come the birds, and the woodlands ring With sharp beak stammer — The sudden clamor Of the woodpecker's hammer At the door of Spring.

Nature notes: What to see and hear in March?

Spring has arrived and from the equinox on 20 March there will be more day than night. Yellow is the colour of early spring. Look out for dandelions, lesser



celandines and primroses on grass verges, in hedgerows and parks. These early flowers all provide a much-needed source of nectar for bees and butterflies. March is a busy time for birds: listen for the rich dulcet tones of the blackbird. They are early risers and up well before other birds. They are also early breeders and can have as many as four broods in a good year, with young appearing into late July.

What to cook in March?

Enough chocolate already: try this.

Gluten Free Almond Cake Ingredients

200g softened butter 200g golden syrup 4 eggs at room temperature. 1 tsp almond essence 150g ground almonds 50g gluten free flour 40g flaked almonds

Method

Heat the oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4. Butter a 20cm round cake tin and line with baking parchment. Beat the butter, syrup and sugar together until pale and fluffy. Add the eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Stir in the almond extract. The mixture may look separated at this stage but it will come together once the flour is added. Combine the ground almonds and flour and fold into the mixture. Tip into the prepared tin and



scatter the flaked almonds over the top. Bake for 40-45 mins until golden and a skewer inserted into the centre of the cake comes out clean. Leave to cool completely in the tin before serving.





Old Marston Parish Council report for February

Planning applications from 2 Mortimer Drive, 139A Oxford Road and a variation to the Pavilion in Marsh Lane met with no objections. OCC have informed the PC that its application to install a noticeboard in the bus shelter in Elsfield Road has been approved.

There have been more complaints from residents from St Nicholas Mobile Home Park about the development at Marston Paddock in Butts Lane. The clerk is arranging a meeting with the development site manager.

The PC reviewed notes from the meeting between the parish, county and city councils to look at existing and potential traffic congestion and speeding issues in the parish and decided to look at funding a survey to provide data on speed, volume, vehicle type, times etc. A working party has been formed to look at locations around the whole parish suitable for monitoring traffic.

Despite the efforts of OC councillors, the parish clerk and several residents, the water leak on the Oxford Road has still not been resolved. It recently became dangerous with the water frozen and people slipping on the ice. Oxford Direct Services and Thames Water are each stating it is the other's responsibility. The clerk is contacting the Oxford Mail, asking it to highlight the situation and prompt a resolution.

The next OXCLEAN is on Saturday 2 March at 10am, meeting outside the Mortimer Hall. Sacks and litter pickers will be provided. All volunteers will be very welcome and we look forward to see you there.
