Dear Friends

May the 4th has become known as Star Wars Day and who could be surprised? If you are a Star Wars fan, you will spend this day saying the words, May the fourth be with you! And as dutiful Anglicans we are inclined to answer: and also with you! As a fan I was rather pleased that I was able to arrange my licensing and Installation as Vicar of Marston and Elsfield on May the 4th in 2017. This year on the 4th I will be marking my seventh year here. Wow - where have those seven years gone? When I look back I realise how busy we have been.

Seven is an important number in the Bible; it frequently symbolises fullness or completeness. Often, we see the number seven in reference to holy works of God. For example, God creates the earth in six days (Genesis 1) and commanded the Israelites to make the seventh day of the week the Sabbath, a holy day, when they abstained from working (Exodus 20:8-11). I'm not suggesting my seventh year signifies any completion in serving our parishes - not at all! But I do believe there is something significant about this year and I look to Leviticus 25: 3-4 for a bit of inspiration...

3 For six years sow your fields, and for six years prune your vineyards and gather their crops. **4** But in the seventh year the land is to have a year of sabbath rest, a sabbath to the Lord.

The land is to have a year of rest. The Benefice has been busy and we have all seen much change since 2020. Rest, leading to patience, means being present, open and aware; it makes space to see what needs tending to and what needs letting go. After seven years in ministry you begin to feel you belong to the story and history of the place, knowing names and understanding the importance of people past and present. Which is why I feel it's important to share our church's financial concerns with the wider community, understanding that St Nicholas church is owned and valued by the whole parish of Marston. It does not just belong to those who share the Christian faith, but also to everyone who has connections through local history, memories of growing up in the

village, loved ones buried here. I believe all of us make up the rich tapestry of St Nicholas' family.

Over the years St Nicholas church has been blessed with many generous donors who have given time and money towards the fabric of the building which holds so much history and is loved by so many. The work the church does in mission and pastoral care contributes to the flourishing and growth of Marston's present and future generations.

Some of you will feel more connected to the physical building and some of you will be more concerned with pastoral care and maybe there are a few of you who connect in both ways! Recently, our financial position has changed, so now we are needing be present, honest and open and to be patient: to see what God is orchestrating now in our parish for the next seven years.

On 5 May, at both the 8am and 10am services, we shall be marking this seven years with our Giving Sunday. You may not want to come to a service but please do use this date to consider whether you can give, in time or money, to St Nicholas church. What we can offer will be different for each of us, but a place and space in which to do this together is important. Do contact the churchwardens if you would like to be involved with fundraising or have questions about the fabric of the building: you will be pleased to know there are no immediate plans to do any building works. If you would like to know more about the finances, set up a direct debit, stop giving because your circumstances have changed, or ask questions, speak to Eileen, our treasurer. If you would like to give money, below is our QR code; alternatively you can give via a bank transfer, by using our card reader in church or in cash on the day. It is not only financial giving that we need, though; there are voluntary roles to be filled (helping with live-streaming and with the sound on a Sunday for example). Finally, if you pray, do pray and walk with us. We need our wonderful church family and community to work together on this.

What to quote in May?

A Spring Morning by John Clare

The Spring comes in with all her hues and smells, In freshness breathing over hills and dells; O'er woods where May her gorgeous drapery flings, And meads washed fragrant by their laughing springs. Fresh are new opened flowers, untouched and free From the bold rifling of the amorous bee.

The happy time of singing birds is come, And Love's lone pilgrimage now finds a home; Among the mossy oaks now coos the dove, And the hoarse crow finds softer notes for love.

The foxes play around their dens, and bark In joy's excess, 'mid woodland shadows dark.

The flowers join lips below; the leaves above; And every sound that meets the ear is Love.

Nature notes: What to see and hear in May?

May is a month of abundance. The dawn chorus is at its best this month – do join us for an early bird walk at 6 am on Saturday 4th May, starting at St Nicholas Church, with breakfast afterwards. May sees the return of swifts, an iconic long-distance migrant. Look out for them hurtling overhead in small screaming



parties. In hedgerows, the sweet-scented blooms of dog rose (rosa canina) appear, varying from very pale to deep pink. The flowers are an important nectar source for insects and the orange-red rosehips which appear later in the year provide an autumn feast for birds and mammals.

What to cook in May? NZ school cookies - perfect for picnics Ingredients

Ingredients
125g butter
125g vegan block (I use Stork)
160g granulated sugar
½ tin of condensed milk (decant rest into a plastic tub in fridge for next batch)
½ tsp vanilla extract
480g plain flour
2 tsp baking powder
1 pack dark and 1 pack milk choc chips

Method

Pre-heat oven to 180C/160C fan. Line 2 baking trays with baking parchment. Beat butter, sugar, condensed milk and vanilla extract until the mixture is fluffy and much paler in colour: this can take up to 10 minutes.



Mix in the flour and baking powder, then incorporate the chocolate chips. Split the dough into two equal pieces and roll each into a sausage shape. Slice each piece

into 12 equal pieces. Bake for 20 mins until a nice golden colour. Leave for 3-4 mins before transferring onto a cooling rack to harden.



Bellringers' report - April 2024

Easter Sunday saw a quarter peal with 23 method variations, followed by an outing to Imber (6). Located amidst the tracts of army-controlled land of Salisbury Plain, access to this long-forgotten village is rare, but general ringing and a quarter peal were attempted whilst several hundred tourists swarmed the church, one of the only remaining buildings in the deserted landscape.

On Easter Monday, our annual meet with Kirtlington (8) saw a good hour and a half of ringing at their tower with some newer ringers joining us. The afternoon saw another quarter peal take place back in Marston (1320 Cambridge Surprise Minor). The following day it was out to Monks Risborough (6) and Chinnor (6), the former having not been visited since 2004, the latter last seen in 2015. Then on Wednesday, a practice at Bletchingdon (6). Phew!

The handbells made an appearance at the Mortimer Hall community market on 6 April with many people having a go, asking questions and learning more about where we ring them: at events, talks, and on visits to Scout groups. On 7 April the North Oxford Youth Ringers visited the Marston tower.

We were shocked and saddened to hear of the untimely death of former Marston ringer Dr Andrew Dunn, who had been a regular with our band for many years, especially for quarter peal ringing. It seemed only fitting that a quarter peal (34 method variations) was rung in his memory on 7 April. Andy rang 183 quarter peals in Marston.

Old Marston Parish Council report for April

At the April PC meeting there were no objections to planning applications from 14 Beechey Avenue, 95 Oxford Road and 52 Oxford Road.

Oxfordshire County Council has advised that it will fund cutting of the grass verges once a year; Oxford City Council has agreed to fund a further cutting, making two per year. However, grass cuttings will only be collected from certain pilot areas: the only such area in Old Marston is along Marston Road. The PC does not have the funds to pay for additional cuts and if grass cuttings are not being collected they would clog drains and defeat any objective of increasing biodiversity. The PC is, therefore, looking at how the cuttings can be collected and where they can be taken. A grass cutting and litter picking contractor has now been appointed, so improvements should be seen at the Mortimer Hall Recreation Ground, Boults Lane Recreation Ground and Elsfield Road cemetery.

The PC has agreed to fund a survey looking at the speed and volume of traffic, vehicle types and times. This will give a good baseline as to the current traffic situation before any potential developments are built or any low traffic network schemes are installed.

On 6 April the second Community Market, supported by a grant from the PC, was well attended. The next market will be on Sat 6 July .

Parish Councillor Peter Williams held a talk at Bradlands, on Wed 10 April, with refreshments provided by the PC. The subject of the talk was the natural history of Old Marston. There were over 20 people attending, with many asking when the next talk will be. Thank you to Peter for such an interesting and well-presented lecture.

The Annual Parish meeting will be on Mon 20 May at 7pm in Mortimer Hall. This is a legal requirement and entirely separate from the annual PC meeting, which is held a week earlier. Parishioners can come to raise what is an issue for them locally or thank people for a job well done.

The next meeting will be on **Monday 13 May at 7pm** in the Mortimer Hall.
