## NEWS ABOUT THE CHURCH RESTORATION

All new stone used on the Church is selected quality Clipsham stone from the quarries of Messrs. George A. Medwell & Son, Clipsham, Rutland.

The work already done on the tower has received high praise from those who have inspected it. Unfortunately, it cannot be inspected easily except from the west side, though glimpses of it can be caught from the corner of Elsfeld Road and Oxford Road.

The western portion of the tower has been completed, and in order to make the most use of the scaffolding whilst available the rest of the tower will be completed shortly, and the cost of this together with the certain internal work in the belfry and some very urgent work at the junction of the nave and chancel will cost about £1,500. This will complete the first stage of the Restoration.

The four gargoyles are being replaced at a cost of about £25 each, and two of these have now been put in position.

Anyone interested in the full details of the Restoration may inspect the detailed specification, together with the variation orders made on closer inspection. Please ask the Churchwardens or Vicar concerning this.

It will be known that the Contractors are Axtell & Perry, the well-known Oxford firm, one of whose Directors, Mr. F. Buck, is a Marston man. We are also fortunate to have as stonemason Mr. Ivor Bridgewater, of Mortimer Drive, who was married in this Church and whose son Alan was baptised here in 1954.

## NEWS OF THE RESTORATION FUND

### First Report

At the time of going to press, the Restoration Fund stands at £785 5s. 10d. As will be known, we are seeking to raise in three years, or less, the sum of £2,500, and this is the first report on the progress made.

The amount brought forward from 1955 was £340 17s. 0d., which included £229 8s. 10d. from last year's Fête, £21 15s. 1d. in Donations, and £31 9s. 11d.

from Christmas Services and Carols. This means that the total raised since the issue of the Restoration Appeal is £444 8s. 10d.

From this must be deducted the costs of printing not yet paid. To this must be added in due course the grant of £100 which the Oxford Diocesan Church Buildings Committee voted on June 15th.

**The Givers.** The donations to the fund have ranged from a few shillings to twenty-five pounds. It will be known that this Parish has no wealthy families on which to rely; nor has it any Lord of the Manor or connexions with ancient foundations or owners of extensive lands. There is no single person in the parish who, however much he wished, could bear the major share of the Restoration costs. This has put us on our mettle, and this is good. It means that a number of the older families of the village with a sense of responsibility for our beautiful old church have made a great effort and in some way or other given or raised sums of the order of £25 or a similar amount.

But not all are able to do this, and others have accordingly done what they can, or have indicated that they will make a great effort during the course of this year.

From the beginning we have made it clear that every contribution is a very real help. No sum is too small, and it has been touching to receive many small gifts, which are obviously the result of self-sacrifice (see the paragraph "An Old-Age Pensioner"). The first collecting-box to be returned full to the top was from the Old Folk at "The Laurels" Home at Headington!

From the list of donations received so far, it is clear that a good many of the gifts have come from friends outside the parish, who have a special place in their interest and prayers for St. Nicholas Church.

**Firms and Groups of Friends.** We are grateful to Mr. and Mrs. Passey (Passey's Motors) and Mr. Davis (Vardoc Fabrics Ltd.) for their contributions. Brasenose College has sent a cheque, as also the Vicar and Congregation of the City Church of St. Martin with All Saints, in the High Street, from which the Vicar came when appointed to Marston. The Old Folk at "The Laurels" Home, Headington, sent a full box of coins by Mrs. Swain, and the Senior Wives' Fellowship Tea at Eaglesfield by Mrs. Carter.

**The "Marston Market".** An outstanding success is the "Marston Market" held every Saturday morning, a suggestion made by Mrs. Kensington. Since it started at the beginning of May, £3 to £5 has been made each week, the total to date being £40 10s. 11d. Small items for sale are welcomed—seedlings, slips, flowers, sweets, cakes, eggs, flowers, books, etc. It is rather like a "Bring and Buy" sale, and the continued success is a testimony to the value given. It will be held throughout the summer. All are welcome to share in this effort. Remember, every Saturday, 10.15 to 11. A number of people have asked why the envelopes given out in May have not been collected. The answer is a twofold one: in some cases the distributors of the *Marston News* have not been able to call when you are at home, and in other cases they have not called again because they did not want to worry you with another call! In some cases the original letter has been lost, and if that is so, another will gladly be supplied.

In order to save you trouble a further slip is enclosed, so that we can do what you wish in this matter.

Thank you to all those who in so many ways are helping forward this effort!

**Churchyard.** The Faculty for the levelling of certain untended mounds and removal of kerbs thereof, in the case of graves not opened in this century, has now been granted. There will be no drastic change in the appearance of the Churchyard, except a gradual reduction of the steeper mounds and the removal of half-submerged kerbs which have effectively prevented mowing in the past. As will be known, this is the culmination of plans and enquiries over twelve months. We are grateful to all who have come forward to identify various graves. There is now a scale map of the Churchyard made by Mr. A. R. Hill, with every grave marked, with all names as far as possible. A photostat of this is framed in Church and another copy deposited in the Bodleian Library.

In the meantime it has been possible, with the aid of the Rotoclythe purchased earlier this year, to cut the portion on the south side of the Church, and it is hoped next year, when the north side has been prepared, to cut that similarly. For this year the north side is being cut by hand through the kind offices of a member of the church who wishes to remain anonymous.

**Children's Society.** The Children's Society (formerly "Waifs and Strays") is seventy-five years of age this year. The children of the Sunday School are seeking to raise at least £4 by November. This will be put in a purse, and the purses will be presented to Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother in the Royal Albert Hall on Monday, November 5th, when we hope someone from the Sunday School will be present to hand our purse to the Queen Mother. Please make a note of this address and phone for future reference.

It is good to see that at last the telephone is being installed at many of the new houses in the parish. It is useful for a church to have a telephone link with at least one house in every road. So when your phone arrives, be sure to let the Vicar know your number. In case of sickness, accident or trouble it is specially helpful for the authorities, who often consult a Vicarage to know how to get a message quickly to a particular street.

**Whitsun Farthings.** Congratulations to the Sunday School on being able to collect the equivalent of 6,340 farthings, which were presented to the Bishop of Oxford in the Cathedral by Colin Gratton and June Clarke on Whit-Tuesday. The largest number of coins collected was 601 halfpennies by June Clarke. The largest number of actual farthings was 74, by Allan Savage.
