



Staying a little longer

Yesterday, a little later than usual, my daughter and I took our dog Nox for a walk at dusk: an evening graced with a beautiful sunset and sweet birdsong. Nox relished the extra freedom to chase a stick, sniff every



clump of grass and career through fields covered in buttercups. He was enjoying himself so much that when we called him back, near the end of our walk, he did the classic dog trick of bounding up to us,

then darting away, stick in mouth, circling around in an attempt to make the walk last just a little longer.

If you popped into the church hall a quarter of an hour before home time on a Wednesday morning, you would find four or five toddlers squealing with delight and running around the large space, while parents and volunteers tidy and hover. It is always a joy to see the children relishing their freedom, their enjoyment in just being in the moment, away from structured tasks. Their reluctance to leave after a busy session of playing and singing is just a desire to make the fun last a little longer.

This staying after the official finishing time is something I encounter in other children's activities too. There are always the two or three families determined to complete every craft at Messy Church, while we tidy around them. I admit, when I attended Messy Church with our then young children, this was our family! Then there are the reluctant teens, at the end of Pulse youth group, who want to keep chatting, playing games or eating. At the end of our Summer Holiday Club last year, some children had to be collected from the church pews: they simply did not want to leave after such a busy and exciting day.

I think this theme of wanting to stay is a good sign. It means young people are keen to attend, rather than being dragged along reluctantly. The same theme of wanting to stay and keep the party going can be found

in several different Bible verses. Jesus often tried to withdraw from the crowds, yet people kept searching for him and tried to stop him leaving (Luke 4:42). The disciple Peter is mentioned a number of times for not wanting to leave the Lord's presence. In John 6:67-8 he asks where else he should go if he is not to stay with Jesus. At the Transfiguration he says 'Lord, it's good for us to be here', offering to build shelters for Jesus, Elijah and Moses, so that the moment won't end.

For some, wanting to stay might be the warmth of familiarity, or the hope of more fun. For others it may be about remaining in God's presence just a little while longer, enjoying friendship and fellowship, or simply preferring to be there rather than somewhere else.



With these thoughts in mind, I am pleased to announce the return of two opportunities to attend events we have enjoyed before. On Wednesday, 22 June, between 9.30am and 4pm we shall be holding our annual Summer holiday Club for children aged 4-12, themed 'High Five Fest'. On Sunday 2 August at midday we invite everyone in our community to the annual Summer Barbecue lunch at the Vicarage. What to quote in June?

Nature notes: What to see and hear in June?

Summer is here and there is much to see. You might spot fledgling birds (they will have downy feathers and a yellow gape at the beak) in your garden or local park. Parents will be close by so it's best not to interfere. Look out for butterflies including the small



tortoiseshell (pictured), so-called because of the yellow and black stripes on its forewings. Nettles are vital to this butterfly for egg laying so why not leave a patch of nettles in your garden? June can be hot so do give wildlife a helping hand by providing fresh water in your garden.

What to cook in June

Roasted rhubarb with elderflower cream

Ingredients

For the rhubarb:

400g trimmed rhubarb cut into 4cm slices.

110g castor sugar

½ lemon, zested and juiced

2 tbsp elderflower cordial

For the cream:

300ml double cream

2tbsp elderflower cordial

100g full fat yoghurt

Method

Line a high sided baking tray with parchment and add the rhubarb. Top with sugar, lemon juice, zest and



cordial. Cover with foil and roast for 25mins in a pre-heated oven at 200C/180C fan/gas 6. When cold put it in the fridge until required.

In a large bowl, whip the cream until stiff (but not butter) and carefully fold in the yoghurt and cordial. To serve, spoon rhubarb into individual glasses, top with the cream and serve with meringues, sponge fingers or shortbread.



Old Marston Parish Council Report - May

The PC had no objections to planning applications from 13 Salford Road, 60 Mortimer Drive, 15 Salford Road and 3 Cotswold Crescent. The PC had concerns with the application from 59 Cherwell Drive and asked for it to be called in. OCC advised the PC that an application from 32 Oxford Road had been approved while one from 44 Arlington Drive had been refused.

The chair of council for 2026/27 is Duncan Hatfield and the vice-chair Charlotte Vinnicombe. The council has co-opted Dr Bede Constantinides onto the council to fill one of its two vacancies. This still leaves one gap and the Clerk would be very pleased to hear from any parishioner who would consider filling it.

Regarding the recent dog attacks, a representative of Thames Valley Police states: *Police have now completed a full review of all relevant reports, evidence, and investigative actions linked to this matter. Having assessed the available evidence against the required legal thresholds, I can confirm that the most recent report has been filed as No Further Action (NFA). This decision has been taken made on the basis that there is no realistic prospect of conviction, primarily due to inconsistencies in the evidence and the inability to definitively identify the dog responsible for the reported incident.* The PC has asked the Clerk to write to the Chief Constable expressing its concerns.
