Joy

The highlight of my summer (so far) has been standing in a sunny field in Dorset with at least five thousand other people, all singing The Wheels on the Bus. My middle son was sat upon my shoulders whilst my other two children danced with an enthusiasm that was



bordering on dangerous, alongside equally exuberant children and adults. Mr Tumble, the singer on the enormous festival stage leading us in

this group hysteria, is in my opinion an absolute rockstar despite being best known as a children's entertainer. It was an unexpected, joyous moment for our family during our time at Camp Bestival, a family festival: one that I will treasure alongside many already made and, I pray, many more yet to come.

Whilst some moments of joy come can come in the most unexpected of places, others have an element of planning. It was my privilege to officiate at a wedding a couple of weekends ago, and I got to be in the middle of the joy and excitement as two families gathered to celebrate the marriage of a couple completely in love. The sun was shining, everyone was smiling and there was an excited buzz in the air. It took all my self-control to remind myself that I was there to do a serious job of marrying people rather than to let my hair down and join in the fun. The day was many months in the planning and the memory of the ceremony is one I and the couple will treasure too.



The summer months bring for many of us happy memories of the long school holidays, trips away with family or friends, or simply idling the time away dozing in the garden whilst a book rests unread on a knee. Yet joy is not confined to the obviously happy seasons of life, nor does it only arrive when everything is easy, settled, or carefully arranged. It is not every day that we find ourselves in a festival field or attending a wedding. Amongst these events, I have also taken a number of funerals, visited grieving families and

visited the sick and housebound in and around Old Marston. There are seasons when joy feels distant; when the circumstances of life make it hard to notice anything beyond what must be carried at that point. In those times talk of joy can sound naïve, as though it asks us to pretend that everything is fine when it clearly is not. But true joy is not the same as denial,



being happy simply for the sake of it. Rather, joy is a quiet and strong disposition that I admire in many people I meet. Those who I learn from most are those who find joy in other people finding joy. Whilst their own days of standing in fields rocking

out to a man dressed as clown or donning their finest to attend a wedding are now only memories, these people find a special kind of joy in other people, whether that be tales of holidays and adventure or a memory of a loved one now gone. Finding joy in other people is something I would like to get better at.

Joy may come unexpectedly or need a little planning, but it also needs to be practised. We can train ourselves to pay attention: to the sound of children laughing, to listen to the friend who calls with their exciting tales, or the stranger who is having a good day and they give us a cheery smile on the way to the shop. Joy can be found in the ordinary routines of our own life and in those who live around us. These things may seem small, but they are not insignificant. The joy of that summer field in Dorset was unexpected, almost ridiculous, and all the more precious because of it. It reminded me that joy is not always grand or dignified. Sometimes it is loud, chaotic, sung badly and shared with thousands of strangers.

Sometimes it is planned for months. But often it is discovered in the routine of day-to-day life, which is important for those days when life makes joy difficult for ourselves: we can still find it in other people. Whatever you have done or plan to do this summer, I pray you find some joy and I pray you get to share that joy with someone else.

Nature notes: What to see and hear in September?

September marks the start of Autumn with cooler



mornings and occasional mists. After the torrid summer heat, birds and small mammals will be actively looking for

hedgerow treats including berries and crab apples. You might spot bracket fungi on deciduous trees, including the spectacular chicken of the woods, with its thick yellow-orange flesh (pictured). Look out for garden spiders. These common orb spiders vary in colour from greyish to reddish-brown with a distinct white cross on their back; females are larger, growing up to 2 centimetres excluding their legs. Completely harmless to humans, the spider's venomous bite will kill small insects ensnared in its web.

What to cook in September?

Smoked haddock chowder

Ingredients

50g butter
3-4 sliced medium leeks
½ tsp dried thyme
1 large potato, peeled and diced
200g frozen sweetcorn
2 smoked haddock fillets
Enough milk to cover the fish
Black pepper
Chopped fresh parsley

Method



Heat the butter in a deep pan on the hob. When melted add the leeks and thyme. Cover with a tight-fitting lid and simmer gently for about 10 minutes. Add the potatoes and sweet corn and cook for another 10 minutes. In another pan, add the haddock fillets, bay leaf and pepper. Simmer gently for 10 minutes. When just cooked remove the bones from the haddock, break it into chunks and place it in the pan with the potatoes. Pour in the milk from the fish pan. Remove the bay leaf. Bring back to a gentle simmer and add the chopped parsley before serving with chunky bread.

Old Marston Parish Council Report - August

There was no PC meeting in August and business was quiet.

Oxford CC has approved the planning application from 15 Haynes Road.

OxFest at the end of July was well attended with positive feedback. This was funded by the PC, as was the fireworks display last year and the autumn and spring fun days at the church hall. The PC is keen to support local events that are enjoyed by the whole community.

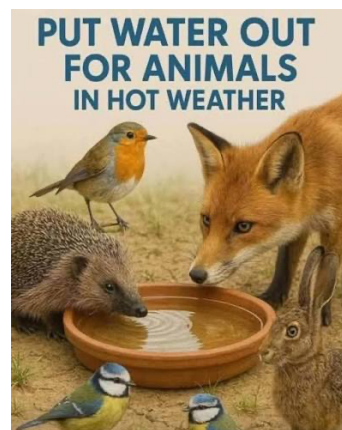
The PC is looking at ideas to make the Orchard Triangle a better place to visit for both people and wildlife. If you have any ideas, then please do get in touch. Also please do remember our local wildlife, especially the birds and hedgehogs, by putting out water.

The development at Oxford City Council-owned Almonds Farm in Mill Lane has started. There are concerns about the consequential increase of construction traffic, adding to that of the Hill View Farm project, especially along Oxford Road, Cherwell Drive and Marsh Lane. The developers at both projects are trying to coordinate transport to minimise congestion.

As a result of the three developments in this part of Old Marston, the PC is also looking to develop the recreational ground in Mill Lane, owned by OPT and managed by the PC. A group of local residents has formed a working group. If you have any ideas or would like to get involved, then please do get in touch.
